A New Forum in Faith

Some time back, a small group of UCC members started talking about establishing a new organization to benefit

the business community of Fort Worth. The genesis moment came when Michael Johnston and I were having breakfast. He had been talking about some of the challenges he faced as a business person who happened to also be a person of faith. He wondered what it would be like to have a network upon which one could call to discuss the particularities of faith, business and ethics. Over the next few months, several UCC members (Jerry Conatser, Urbin McKeever, Michael Johnston and I) met to discuss the need for such an organization and the possibility of UCC being the sponsoring organization. The Faith Business

Forum, an interfaith-based gathering of spiritual and business leaders, is the outcome of that process.

We held our first breakfast forum on Thursday, November 6, at Ashton Depot. Ricky Dickson, Vice President of Sales and Marketing for Blue Bell Creameries, was our first guest speaker. There were sixty people from a variety of businesses and faith communities in attendance, a majority of whom have committed to joining and supporting the endeavor. We plan to meet in mass three times a year, while creating opportunities for smaller groups to gather around topics of specific interest on a more regular basis. Having completed a very successful trial run, we will be opening the membership to any interested parties in the Fort Worth area, and especially to the members of UCC.

We owe a great deal of thanks to Jerry Conatser and Conatser Management Group for sponsoring our first gathering. My assistant, Thelia Chaffin, and Michael Johnston's assistant, Diana Broadwater, are due our thanks as well. As you might imagine, they made everything happen as planned and on schedule.

This is the sort of creative endeavors that we, as members of this faith community, are able to accomplish because of the history and support of this congregation. It is one more way we engage our community with open minds and loving hearts. I do hope you will join us at our next forum. We will provide you with ample information well in advance. They have sent thank you notes, Christmas cards, introduced us to their parents and some even kept in touch for a period of time after they graduated.

Bottom line is that we were there for them whether they needed us or not and that felt like the best place to be!



About the Composer
One of the most special treats of the 2015 BHYL Festival will be the return of Randol Alan Bass to conduct the orchestra and choir and continue to teach his updated musical score. Through gifts

from individuals and the Boar's Head Guild, Mr. Bass was hired in 2013 to enhance the instrumentation, rework the organ and bell parts, and redo all the music scores. Every favorite tune such as Let All Mortal Flesh and Angels We Have Heard on High is still heard in the production and the orchestral parts

are freshened. Additionally, for the 2015 performances, our senior organist, Kyla K. Rosenberger, will debut two new organ pieces composed by Mr. Bass.

Mr. Bass composed the former Boar's Head musical score while in his early 20's at the request of his teacher and mentor, Ronald Shirey. He is excited to have had the chance to hone and polish this project with all the musical wisdom gained in his career since 1976. Mr. Bass regularly composes for major symphony orchestras here and in Europe, and his choral works have been recorded numerous times by professional and college choirs. We are blessed to have him travel from Austin to lead and inspire our Epiphany music.

Christmas Cantata

On Sunday, December 7, the Chancel Choir will present one of their favorite works, John Rutter's Gloria, with brass, organ, and percussion. The text of the

Gloria can be traced as far back as 380 A.D. as an early prose hymn, and is also known as the hymnus angelicus (hymn of the angels) since it begins with the hymn sung by the angels at Christ's nativity ("Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men of good will"—Luke 2:14). In a liturgical sense, the *Gloria* is the second part of the Ordinary of the Mass, the Catholic ritual consisting of five parts (Kyrie, Gloria, Credo,

Sanctus, Benedictus) whose text remains constant each day the Mass is said. Since the text of the Mass of the Ordinary never changes, it has been a favorite vehicle for composers to set to music for centuries. Some composers set all five parts of the Mass to music (Mozart Mass in C, Beethoven Mass in C, Bach B minor Mass, to name a few) while others choose to set only a portion of the Mass, such as Rutter's setting of the Gloria. While many musical settings of the Mass are actually used in worship services, most such compositions are intended for performance only, and over the centuries hundreds of such compositions have been created and performed.

The full text of the *Gloria* is (along with the *Credo*) one of the longest texts of the Mass, and it addresses itself to each

Person of the Holy Trinity: God the Father–*Gloria in excelsis Deo*, translated "Glory to God in the highest"–God the Son–*Domine Fili unigenite, Jesu Christe*, translated "Lord Jesus Christ, the only begotten Son"–and the Holy Spirit–*Cum Sancto Spiritu*, translated "With the Holy Spirit."

Though the text comes from our ancient Christian services, the setting and instrumentation is fresh, contemporary and appealing to all. Please join the Chancel Choir in praise to the newborn King by coming to morning worship at 9 or 11 a.m. on December 7 to hear *Gloria* by the renowned English composer, John Rutter. A ten-piece instrumental ensemble of TCU music students and faculty will accompany this sermon-in-song.

Of Many Colors-This Christmas Season!



The evening of December 15, hear a special, original presentation of Christmas carols in jazz-gospel style, backed by an instrumental quartet and directed by UCC member, Jim Hodges. OMC has a fun, appealing sound.

Hear these words from UCC member and tenor singer, Rick Hill: "OMC provides us with a completely different platform for performance, one with jazz and r&b rhythms, harmonies and instruments. Our rehearsals and performances are full of fun and laughter, and we have the privilege of singing Jim Hodges' truly inspired hymn arrangements and original choral works. Plus, we get to perform with fine professional players who make up OMC's jazz instrumental ensemble. Finally, and most importantly, we connect with our audiences in the joy, love, praise and worship of our God."

Additionally, hear this testimony from UCC member and alto, Robin Davis: "What is it like to sing with *Of Many Colors?* Well...it's like being part of a wonderful, crazy, mixed-up family. Each voice is distinctly beautiful and unique. Each singer brings a colorful style from a variety of music backgrounds. Yet when

we sing together, we are one-coming together to sing for the glory of God. Our music, written and arranged by the incredibly talented Jim Hodges, conveys the many stories of God's love through Jesus Christ and our yearning for peace in a hurting world. I have sung with OMC since its beginning, and truthfully, I look forward to singing with my OMC brothers and sisters more than anything I know. What happens when we sing together, whether it's in rehearsal or in concert, always hits me right smack dab in the middle of my heart. I like to think that's God's way of telling me that he's listening...and that it's good."

This varied choral concert is in the UCC Sanctuary, Monday, December 15, at 7 p.m. Free admission.

Gifts of Hope Program Descriptions

University Christian Church Signature Outreach Ministries offer help and hope to individuals and families within our community.

The Children's Closet, a ministry of University Christian Church, provides new uniforms, clothing and school supplies to disadvantaged children in Fort Worth.

The Congo Initiative, an 18-month emphasis of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), offers awareness and assistance through projects that increase the amount of available farmland through the Ikengo Agricultural Center, expand the Water Project providing additional wells for potable water and build empowerment of girls through elementary and secondary education opportunities.

Doctors Without Borders–Médecins Sans Frontières provides assistance to populations in distress, to victims of natural or man-made disasters and to victims of armed conflict. They do so irrespective of race, religion, creed or political convictions.

Global Ministries, in mission in more than 90 countries and in covenant with more than 160 partner churches and ecumenical bodies around the world, is the joint global mission outreach effort of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Christ.

The Heifer Project International provides families with income-producing plants and animals and training in their care. HPI educates partners in community building and sustainable agriculture, providing daily nutrition and additional income for basic needs and education of children.

Nicaragua Mission joins in the work of Project Chacocente (Out of the Dump) in Managua as they move families from the city dump to the clean air and fertile soil of rural Masaya, learning skills for living independently AND La Mission Cristiana (The Christian Mission Church of Nicaragua), working to offer care and assistance "from the poor to the even more poor."

Rippling Hope helps plan and resource domestic, ecumenical, short-term mission experiences rooted in the vision of a just society by "connecting communities, channeling hope, changing lives!"

Southwest Good Samaritan Ministries provides assistance to hundreds of people in need, especially Central American political refugees, and individuals from other countries in political and economic turmoil. Their ministry is to teach the love of Jesus Christ by building a renewed wholeness and dignity in those who are broken, disenfranchised and displaced.

Tarrant Area Food Bank empowers communities to eliminate hunger by providing food, education and resources through innovation and collaboration.

Musical Musings on Advent

We have a custom at UCC of having different individuals, families and groups light the candles in the Advent

wreath at the front of the Sanctuary. With two Sunday services and four Advent Sundays and four Christmas Eve services, everyone attending worship in December will see, hear and partake in this added ceremony to our usual worship.

Our Advent wreath has five candles. Purple candles signify preparation and royalty. The rose candle signifies joy and Mary, the Mother of God. A white candle in the middle of the wreath symbolizes purity and light and is lighted on Christmas Eve. Watching the candles being progressively lit helps us mark the movement of time towards Christmas.

We are concentrating on Wonder this

Advent in scripture, sermon and song. You will notice themes of Wonder of the Season, Wonder of the Word, Wonder of the Message, Wonder of Hope and Wonder of Christmas. Notice the texts of the hymns each Sunday as they progress from themes of spiritual preparation to celebration of Christ's birth. We will also join together to sing a new candlelighting song composed by Joel Raney, The Wonder of Christmas, at every service.

Youth Participate in interfaith Trialogue

Youth in grades eight through twelve participated in an Interfaith Trialogue with our Muslim and Jewish neighbors over the course of four Sundays. October 26, Beth-El Congregation hosted the gathering and taught about the tenets, practices and traditions of the Jewish faith. November 2, participants from the three faith communities gathered for a showing of the short documentary film Jerusalem at the Museum of Science and History's IMAX theater. November 9, the Islamic Association of Tarrant County hosted the event at their mosque and provided a deeper understanding of Islam. The final event took place here at UCC November 16, providing youth and adults an opportunity to present the Christian faith in general and common beliefs and practices of Disciples in particular. In addition to tours of the houses of worship and presentations about the three faiths, each event included significant small group time for youth from the three faith communities to get to know one another better and learn about the respective faiths influence their lives as teenagers. Just Say Know Sexuality Education for Children and Youth



University Christian Church will again offer sexuality education courses for children and youth in 2015 utilizing Just Say Know,

a comprehensive curriculum that provides a faith-based approach to understanding human sexuality.

Many at UCC have encountered this curriculum at Disciples Crossing, where "Eighter's Camp" provides rising ninth graders with a deeper understanding of sexuality and spiritualty in a weeklong church camp setting. *Just Say Know* offers a way for churches to expand that important program to additional age groups within the congregation, and

includes a one session class for older elementary students (genders separate, with a parent), a two session class for middle school students (with a parent), and a ten session class for high school students. This year, UCC will offer the elementary course on the afternoon of February 8 and the middle school course on the afternoons of February 15 and 22. We will offer the high school course again in 2016 in a weekend retreat format.

Just Say Know is rooted in the idea that sexuality is a gift from God that is intended to be shared responsibly, and that individuals need as much accurate information as possible to help them develop a healthy appreciation for that gift. Each class focuses on topics appropriate for the intended age group, ranging from hygiene and body changes in the elementary course to dating violence and college "hook up" culture in the high school course. The curriculum is also designed to help participants become educators themselves, sharing what they have learned with friends who may not have attended a comprehensive course on human sexuality.

Near the end of my sabbatical, I will be attending the Progressive Youth Ministry Conference in Chicago, a gathering of youth workers from around the country serving churches that have much in common with our own.

During the weeks when I'm not traveling, I'm going to worship at some other congregations in the metroplex that are doing interesting things, and I'm thankful that I will be able to read more, exercise regularly, spend time with my family and take some cooking and home improvement classes.

Unless we see significant increases in participation at all levels to reach our goals (pledges, giving, and participation within ministry areas), church leadership will have to scrutinize our costs to ensure that we are fiscally responsible and not over extending our human and financial resources.

I can't reiterate enough what a critical time this is in the history of our church—a place that has helped shape so many lives and serves as God's hands and feet in our community.

It matters—every pledge matters, every time you come to church matters, every time you participate in a ministry matters. Supporting UCC is a responsibility entrusted to each of us and a responsibility worth supporting! It matters!
