LENT AND EASTER

As the sun's light lingers in the sky, the lengthening of days begins. The word lent comes from the Old English word lencten, meaning "spring"; literally, lent is the lengthening of days. At University Christian Church this Lenten season, we will be focusing on the process of the growth that occurs as our days lengthen and the time for growth begins. By preparing the ground and sowing the seeds of the fruits of the spirit, we anticipate receiving the Good News!

The inspiration for the Lenten theme, Good Ground, Good Seeds, Good News! grew out of the positive feedback received from the January 11 sermon. The idea of torn skies and broken ground as a means of making room for change resonated with those present. In light of this response, we will seek to build upon the ideas introduced in that message. Paul offers in Galations 5 the fruits of the spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. We intend to offer, for consideration, the gifts of the Spirit as good seeds to be planted in the rich soil of our lives, all the while nurtured by the Good News of God's love.

As you prepare to walk through the Lenten season, be aware of these experiences that will provide opportunities for you to grow and move toward resurrection.

Lenten Sermon Series

Our Lenten sermon series is based on our Lenten theme: Good Ground, Good Seeds, Good News! Each Sunday, one of our ministers will explore the gifts of the Spirit as described by the Apostle Paul in Galatians. The sermons will be based upon the premise that these gifts are signs of the Spirit's presence in our lives and thus in our world, while at the same time, acknowledging that for many, they remain ideas rather than realities. We hope to draw upon the examples others, biblical and historical characters, and perhaps contemporary personalities as a means of moving beyond the position of an observer of the qualities of the spiritual life, to that of experiencer. Our ultimate example will be found in the good news of God's love made known in the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

We hope you will join us each Sunday

during Lent. As means of preparing for a most satisfying worship experience, you might want to become familiar with Galatians 5.

Fallow Time will take place 8:15-9 a.m. each Sunday morning in Room 206. A time of sacred silence when we prayerfully wait for God to restore the ground of our spiritual lives and prepare us for growth.

Again this year, Sunday worship at 9 and 11 a.m. will include **silence during the sharing of communion** to provide for added reflection and meditation.

Gratitude

I want to begin this month's note with a genuine expression of gratitude. During the months of November and December, I was

the recipient of numerous expressions of gratitude for my service at UCC. I have long since lost track of the number of thoughtful cards and letters that arrived weekly in my church mailbox and at home. Your kind words and specific expressions of thanks were well timed and deeply appreciated. I am humbled and indebted to your kindness.

The second thing I want to share has to do with our finances. First, I want to thank those of you who made our Red Envelope special offering the most successful in recent history. We received \$58,700 in special Red Envelope gifts this year, \$27,300 more than last year, and \$20,700 more than the year prior. In addition, our Gifts of Hope Special offering was up by \$3,800.

Our 2015 stewardship results fell a little short of our goal, which was basically last year's goal. Even so, we are able to move forward with this year's programming budget and are looking forward to a great year of ministry. Of most concern is the continued loss of pledging units, down twenty-five this year from last. On a positive note, we added 61 new pledging units this year, and 219 increased their pledges to the tune of \$126,600.

As we move gratefully into this New Year, we will be prayerfully considering how to increase our stewardship efforts while remaining exemplary stewards of the gifts that we have received. To be sure, we are grateful to each and every one of you for your generous support of the work of University Christian Church.

forms must be returned to one of the two drop boxes or made on line by the end of the business day, February 15.





Rosemont Elementary Spelling Bee





It is also a part of the Healthy Community Collaborative, an alliance of seven agencies that will expand homeless outreach, mobile crisis outreach, intensive case management, peer support and housing placement to help men and women escape the streets. The center also boasts one of the most successful housing programs funded through the City of Fort Worth Directions Home program.

Breakfast with the Mayor, Friday, February 6, benefits the Day Resource Center. UCC will host a table as our support of the DRC and the significant role they play in screening individuals for the Room in the Inn ministry held here at our church and elsewhere in Fort Worth.



February Toiletries Drive for South Central Alliance

During February UCC will collect toiletries for South Central Alliance of Churches. The Alliance serves families in need in our neighborhood. Individuals, Sunday school classes, and other UCC groups are encouraged to select one or more of the following items to collect and deposit in the blue bin

I have often wished that there were different words for the word, "hope." There are four Greek words for "love" and each has a different meaning. There is only one Greek word for "hope," *elpis*. Since there is only one word in English or Greek, I think about the word "hope" as *hope* or *Hope*.

"I hope that I get an A on that paper!"
"I hope you are coming to my party!"
"I hope that I get that sweater for my birthday!" The little "h" is wishful thinking.

"I Hope that I will be able pay for my child's medicine." I Hope that there is still room in the shelter tonight. It's twelve degrees out here." "I Hope that my mother's cancer will not come back." Biblically, the capital "H" is


confident expectation. In our daily living, "HOPE" is also a "yearning prayer" of expectation.

As you know, our congregation participates in an important program called Room in the Inn. It was started in Nashville, TN, and it continues to move across the country. There are now twenty-three congregations in Fort Worth who, once a week, house people who are homeless during the two warmest and three coldest months of the year. They are our guests. We share a meal, engage in conversation, play games, help our guests write resumes and encourage. The men shower, sleep comfortably and safely for the first time in weeks or months. In the morning, they rise, have a big breakfast, depart with a prepared lunch, and return to the Day Resource Center of Tarrant County by 7 a.m.

I frequently drive our guests from the Day Resource Center to our church. I am always impressed with the positive conversation in the car. December 3, 2014 was our first day of Room in the Inn for the winter program. As our guests were getting into the car for the short trip to the church, Milton, sitting in the front seat asked, "How was your Thanksgiving?" I was somewhat

embarrassed to answer. "It was good, how was yours?" I asked. The conversation among the men moved from family to places they had lived to anticipated work in the future. We arrived at the church, they thanked me for the ride, and we said our good-byes. Room in the Inn has always reminded me of the Christmas story, the "confident expectation" of the impending birth, a warm place to sleep, and the assurance that there is a loving God who cares about each of us. This year, we hosted our guests on December 24. It was an awesome night - much like the night that Mary waited in "confident expectation" that her son would be born. She did not know what the future would hold, but she knew that God was a God of love and God would not disappoint.

As we embrace the meaning of HOPE for our lives, may we be reminded of Mary's confident expectation as she awaited what was to come. As each of us snuggles warmly into our beds this night, may we be reminded that only because God has loved us are we able to love. We are the hands and feet of God on this earth, and we are called to live out God's message of love in our world. Every day, we must ask ourselves, "Whose answer to HOPE will I be today?"

Weekday School Enrollment 2015-16 Deadline



The UCC Weekday School Advisory Board is making plans for the 48th year of the school's program, which will begin in the fall of 2015. The school follows the High Scope Approach

to preschool education, an experiential, developmentally appropriate curriculum as well as the criteria outlined by the NAEYC (National Association for the Education of Young Children). The Weekday School offers morning classes from 9 a.m.-12 p.m. for cribs (eight weeks) through Kindergarten. Optional Early Bird and Discovery Time enrichment programs are also available.

Enrollment forms and fees for the 2015-16 school year will be accepted Monday, January 26, through Wednesday, February 11. If you are a church member not currently enrolled in the school and are interested in requesting a space for your child(ren), packets will be available in the Weekday School Office, Room 101, beginning Monday, January 26, 8:30 a.m.-1 p.m. Monday-Friday.

Accommodating church members is a priority, but please be aware of the demand for our program and that the number of church members turning in packets may be greater than the number of classroom spaces available in any given age level. Requesting a space does not guarantee a place for your child. Note that the church member must be a parent or legal guardian in order to pick up a packet.

WDS Priority Placement Guidelines: Crib Room:

1. Church members' children–*Please note* that the church member must be a parent or legal guardian. (If all things are equal,

- 2. Siblings of current students
- 3. Children on waiting lists

One year olds-four year olds:

- 1. Students currently enrolled in the program (Priority will be given to those families with the most years in program.)
- 2. Number of years family has been enrolled in program
- 3. Siblings of current students
- 4. Church members' children who are not currently enrolled-*Please note that the church member must be a parent or legal guardian*. (If all things are equal, number of years of church membership will be taken into consideration.)
- 5. Children who have been placed on the waiting lists throughout the year

Kindergarten:

Placement of the Kindergarten Class will be determined using the same guidelines listed above. However, acceptance will also take into account girl/boy ratio and age balance within this class. Director discretion will be used in final placement. Additional information about the Kindergarten program is available in the Weekday School Office.
