On August 23, following worship, we will join one another in a food truck extravaganza and time of airconditioned fellowship in Walker Hall. The kiddos will be able to entertain themselves in inflatable bounce houses while the rest of us engage in some light hearted, adult conversation. It looks to be another enjoyable afternoon. We hope you will join us!

You have no doubt heard that a group of UCC folks are exploring, in great detail, the prospects and feasibility of a third Sunday morning worship experience. By the time you read this article a dedicated team of UCC members will have met multiple times and will have made a number of offsite visits to congregations (both within and outside Fort Worth) who have successfully launched, integrated and sustained a non-traditional worship service into their Sunday morning schedule. At this point, the committee's efforts are completely exploratory. We will keep you posted on their efforts and findings, and advise you of opportunities to discuss your concerns and/or support for an additional Sunday morning worship service. In the meantime, please keep the members of the committee in your prayers.

- •A way to bypass capital gains taxes when using appreciated stocks or other securities.
- A future gift to UCC.
