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Fortieth Anniversary of the Boar's Head and Yule Log Festival

Saturday, January 2 and Sunday, January 3. Performances at 3 and 5 p.m. each day in the Sanctuary. Come an hour early to get your seats and visit with your friends.


A brief history of the Boar's Head festival: In the days of the Roman Empire, a boar was the first dish served at great Roman feasts. Much later, in Medieval England, the boar, a ferocious and menacing animal, ruled the great forests of that land. Roasted boar was the staple of holiday banquets at the great manor houses.

Tradition, therefore, preceded the first recorded occurrence of the Boar's Head procession held at Queens College, Oxford shortly after its founding in 1340. Legend has it that an Oxford University scholar retreated to the woods with a volume of Aristotle to study. While there, he was confronted by a raging boar that had been menacing the nearby town. With no weapon available, the resourceful student rammed the metal-bound philosophy book down the beast's throat, killing the boar and saving his own life. That very night the boar's head, roasted, dressed and garnished was carried at the head of a procession into the dining room. The celebration of the student's life came to represent the victory of logic and reason over evil. Eventually a Yule log was added to the procession, since it was the custom to celebrate God's bounty by lighting a new Yule log at the beginning of the new year.

The church then endowed this custom with additional symbolic meaning. With the boar's head symbolizing evil, by portraying the Annunciation, the shepherds seeking out the Christ Child and the Magi following the star of the east, the procession was transformed into a worship of God and the triumph of Christ over evil. At a time when most people were illiterate, the dramatic and symbolic presentation was an effective way to share the Christmas message-that Christ has, indeed, overcome both evil and the threat of death. During the next three or four centuries the procession evolved into a more elaborate festival. Lords, ladies, knights, cooks, hunters, pages and yeoman guards, known as Beefeaters, were added. By 1607 at St. John's College, Cambridge, England, The Boar's Head Carol was sung during the processional as it is to this very day.

The Boar's Head Festival was brought to Colonial America by British settlers and French Huguenots. It is now celebrated in many diverse Christian settings throughout the United States. The festival is traditionally offered following Christmas during the season of Epiphany, which ends the 12th day following Christmas when tradition says that Christ was made known to the Magi.

The In-Between-Time

The first of January is one of those exciting in-betweentimes. I have talked about in-betweentimes before, but primarily within the

context of greater spans of time. Being in-between implies waiting; waiting for an experience or event that follows another. Is it resourceful to live one's life in anticipation of something...else... always; probably not, especially if you fritter away the time between. But how many of us do it anyway?

Time is a precious commodity that once it has expired, it cannot be gotten back. The time between Christmas and Epiphany is in-between-time that is taken for granted. It hasn't always been

this way. Many Christians were once accustomed to twelve days of Christmas and some still observe this tradition. We tend to put more emphasis on Advent and Christmas Day, relegating Christmas Tide (the in-between-space between Christmas and Epiphany) and Epiphany to lesser celebrations—if they are acknowledged at all.

I want to revisit a devotional reading that I encountered during Advent and I want to share it with you in this inbetween-time in hopes of our being reminded of the magnitude of God's love made known to us in the person of Jesus of Nazareth; the babe in a manger –the savior on a cross.

It comes from one of my favorite devotional books, Watch for the Light.

The author of this selection is Madeleine L'Engle. This is an excerpt from her larger contribution entitled *A Sky Full of Children*.

A sky full of God's children! Each galaxy, each star, each living creature, every particle and sub-atomic particle of creation, we are all children of the Maker. From a subatomic particle with a life span of a few seconds, to a galaxy with a life span of billions of years, to us human creatures somewhere in the middle in size and age, we are made in God's image, male and female, and we are, as Christ promised us, God's children by adoption and grace.

I believe this as much as I believe anything! How about you?



But, it is also the public acknowledgement of a covenant with the people of University Christian Church that we as a community of faith will surround the child with the spirit of Christ as they grow in our midst.

screened by the Day Resource Center (DRC).
