I would also like to take just a moment to share with you some rather sobering news about our budget. As you know from my previous article, we were left with some interesting challenges based on the outcome of our most recent stewardship campaign. The pinch we were feeling from an increased rate of non-responding pledges was exacerbated by decreased attendance due to extreme weather conditions. We annually receive somewhere in the neighborhood of \$330,000 in nonpledged giving. The bulk of that is received on Sunday mornings. When attendance is down, so are receipts. Attendance was off significantly during

A dictionary definition of Lent says this: "the period preceding Easter that in the Christian Church is devoted to fasting, abstinence and penitence in commemoration of Christ's fasting in the wilderness. In the Western Church it runs from Ash Wednesday to Holy Saturday and so includes forty weekdays."

These forty days begin for us this year on

March 5. There are several opportunities for our members to remember Christ's time of suffering with special services and music. First, gather around the Labyrinth at 6:30 p.m. on Ash Wednesday, March 5, for a candlelit service devoted to setting the tone for this special time of the Christian calendar.

Then each Sunday morning the exultant *Gloria Patri* we typically sing to God will be replaced with a more contemplative tune from the Taizé Community called *Bless the Lord.* The text is simple, but profound:

Bless the Lord, my soul, and bless God's holy name. Bless the Lord, my soul, who leads me into life.

The music from the ecumenical Church

of Reconciliation in the village of Taizé, France is world-renowned for its peaceful spirituality. Other tunes by its composer, Jacques Berthier, will be sung at our Mid-Week Lenten services starting Wednesday, March 12, in Fellowship Hall.

Finally, plan on savoring prayerful time during Holy Week with Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services at 7 p.m. April 17 and 18. Maundy Thursday features the haunting sound of cello accompanying a dancer interpreting a Bible scene. The Good Friday service of darkness with full choir focuses our hearts on the Crucifixion. Yes, the music is more somber for the season of Lent. But isn't that necessary in order to experience the promise of Easter?

Pray in gratitude for their generous hospitality, for their faithful service to God, and for God's guidance as they and we respond to God's call to share the Good News of God's love from Sarmiento to Fort Worth to the ends of the earth.

Gallery Notes

The Madonnas

Arguably, the subject most often depicted in Christian artwork is the 'Madonna.' Mary is normally portrayed with the Christ Child and often other biblical characters. The earliest representations go back to the Catacombs, but more emphasis on Mary and her proclaimed status as "God-Bearer" in the fifth century, stemmed a continuous growth of art devoted to her.

Our Gallery is fortunate to have no less than eight works of art devoted to the Madonna. We have one thirteenth century Byzantine representation, two sixteenth century copies, one ninteenth century depiction and four twentieth century pieces. Lovers of Renaissance art should take time to view the Madonna and Child with St. John the Baptist (Alba Madonna) and the Madonna Della Sedia (Madonna of the Chair) both on the north wall of the Gallery. In both cases the artist is Raphael (Raphaello Sanzio 1483-1520), a contemporary of Leonardo da Vinci and Michelangelo. Raphael painted no less than twenty-six Madonnas-commissioned works for the rich and famous of the time.

The compositions were more complex, warm and colorful. The Madonnas were less formally dressed and presented robust characteristics in comparison with his early career.



The *Alba Madonna* shows Mary, Jesus and John the Baptist all with their gaze focused on a cross held by the youthful John and the Child Jesus touching his destiny.



The *Madonna della Sedia* (Madonna of the Chair) has Mary and the Child Jesus looking out of the painting at us with questioning gazes while John the Baptist is focused on Jesus and Mary. A small cross at the bottom right is an ever present symbol of the journey Christ will make for us.

Take the time to view all of the Madonnas in our Gallery. The collection is impressive and inspiring.

Backpacks for Kids Now Every Wednesday



Weekends can mean hunger for children who depend on school meals for their primary nutrition. Backpacks for Kids, a program of the Tarrant Area Food Bank (TAFB), supplies backpacks filled with child-

friendly, nonperishable and nutritious food which are handed out discreetly at school each Friday to counselor identified students most at risk of being hungry on the weekend. This growing TAFB program is now being supported by the Outreach budget of UCC with a three year commitment which will enable the introduction of one additional school.

Packing the Backpacks takes place every Wednesday at TAFB, 2600 Cullen Street. This is a great ministry for the whole family or for a group of friends before going out to dinner. As with anyone who visits with our homeless guests, the nursing students had to go through a brief training. But to watch these students that night, you would think they have been doing this forever. Actually, most of them have. When I first met them, they all shared with me how they have worked with the homeless with their churches, youth organizations and their own families. Talking with the guests that night was "just like talking to a new friend," said one. Exactly. Our future is in good hands.
