Having grown up in rural Missouri, I am accustomed to beautiful autumns. With the decreasing hours of daylight the

The cooler temperatures invite a myriad of different activities. There are acres of leaves to be raked and piled only to be scattered again by children. Gardens have to be turned and prepared for winter. The lights from Friday night football burn bright in the night skies as do the bonfires which follow. Ever more noticeable is the number of people out for leisurely strolls. Fall is nature's second wind.

First Leadership Enrichment Lecture Welcomes Dr. Rita Nakashima Brock

A Leadership Enrichment for church leaders and all interested church members will be held Sunday, October 19, beginning

with lunch after church. The presenter will be Rita Nakashima Brock. Her 2008 book, *Saving Paradise: How Christianity Traded Love of This World for Crucifixion and Empire*, written with Rebecca Ann Parker, was selected by *Publishers' Weekly* as one of the year's best books.

Dr. Brock, the first Asian American woman to earn a doctorate in theology, has held several prestigious appointments including the Endowed Chair in the Humanities at Hamline University, the Director of the Fellowship Program at the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard University and a Fellow at the Center for Values in Public Life at the Harvard Divinity School.

In 2004, she co-founded Faith Voices for the Common Good, which works on the public role of progressive religion, and is the founding Co-Director of Brite Divinity School's Soul Repair Center. Dr. Brock is a commissioned minister in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

We also spent time learning new games together—particularly games of strategy and thinking. By the end of Marvin's fifth grade year, he was a pretty good chess player. Whether it was outside playing sports or inside playing games, Marvin was always kind to let me win every once in a while and we both knew it.

I had the opportunity to set goals with Marvin and walk beside him as some of the goals were met and some proved to be very challenging. By the time Marvin completed his fifth grade year, he was taller than me. We had both grown over the time we shared. I would like to think that Marvin got something out of our time together, but I know that the growth I experienced by sharing time with Marvin was far more than the three measured inches of Marvin's height.

Army Chaplaincy Update

It's been a while since I updated the congregation on my service as a chaplain in the Army Reserve, and I wanted to take a moment to share some recent news with you about this ministry.

For those who may not be aware, I attended college on an Army ROTC scholarship and entered the Chaplain Candidate Program after my graduation and commissioning as an officer. I was appointed a chaplain in the Army Reserve in the spring of 2009, and I currently serve as the Brigade Chaplain for the 176th Medical Brigade in Seagoville. In that role I supervise



seven chaplains in medical units located in Little Rock, San Antonio, Seagoville, Topeka and Tulsa. Beyond my role as a supervisor, I also directly support the soldiers in the headquarters company of my brigade by leading chapel services, providing counseling, conducting briefings on suicide prevention and personal resiliency and leading Strong Bonds retreats that help married and single soldiers build healthier relationships.

In addition to weekend responsibilities with my unit each month, I also complete a two-to-three week block of training once each year. In July I spent those three weeks at Fort Hunter Liggett, California, where thousands of Army Reserve soldiers from all over the country converged for an exercise that simulated an overseas deployment. Our brigade provided command and control for all of the medical assets in the exercise, including two Combat Support Hospitals, a ground ambulance company and a veterinary company. As the Brigade Chaplain, I provided oversight and guidance for all of the religious support conducted within hospital and medical settings, prepared briefings on religion and culture in the area of operations, advised the commander and staff on religious considerations related to our mission, and coordinated with other chaplains assigned to the same Base Camp to conduct chapel services and counseling sessions. The excellent training allowed me to sharpen my skills and gain experience in a surprisingly realistic deployment setting, though by the end I was eager to return to a life that didn't involve sleeping and showering in tents and alternating between meals in a dining hall and MRE's (packaged field rations).

I appreciate the support I have received from this congregation while serving as a citizen soldier in the Army Reserve, and I'm thankful that that our church benefits from the world-class training that I receive through my service as a chaplain.

Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter Habitat for Humanity Work Project



On October 1, former U.S. President Jimmy Carter will celebrate his 90th birthday. Four days later, he will put on his familiar work clothes—blue jeans, denim shirt, probably a red bandana—and get to work building yet another affordable home as part of Habitat for Humanity International's annual Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter Work Project.

Since 1984, the Carters have dedicated one week each year to building with Habitat—in the rain in Milwaukee, in a field in Haiti, in inner-city Los Angeles and Philadelphia, along the hurricane-ravaged U.S. Gulf Coast, in South Africa, in Thailand and many points in between. The Carters and their legions of fellow volunteers have built, repaired and rehabilitated 3,883 homes and engaged more than 88,000 volunteers.

In 2014, the Carter Work Project heads

to Dallas and Fort Worth, Texas. From October 5 to 11, the former first couple and hundreds of volunteers will join families to help build thirty homes and renovate twenty others in the East Oak Cliff neighborhood of Dallas, build twenty homes in Fort Worth's Central Meadowbrook neighborhood, and paint an additional forty-four in partnership with the City of Fort Worth's *Cowtown Brush Up* program.

Along with other Trinity Brazos Area Disciples, UCC's faithful Habitat supporters are honored be part of the Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter Build in Fort Worth.
